

1) Does the DSA have any statistics relating to the number of approved driving instructors (ADIs) that are graded six, graded five and graded four? Or the percentages of ADIs that are graded six, graded five and graded four?

In the table below, you can find the number of ADIs that are graded four to six. We have also provided you with the total number of ADIs on the register and the percentages of those that are graded four to six. The information provided is correct as of 1 August 2011.

Grade	Number of ADIs	Percentage
4	24,553	52.2%
5	15,977	34.0%
6	2,840	6.0%
Total	47,037	

Please note that the remainder of ADIs are:

- graded one to three
- not due for a check test
- awaiting a check test to be arranged
- awaiting a further check test after receiving an educational grading after joining the ADI register
